## Rule for Writing Numbers:



Spell out numbers that can be expressed in one or two words and use digits for other numbers! (Write out *twenty* but not 167!)

# **Lesson 7: Hyphens**

**Monday:** Rules for Dividing Words at the End of a Line (Try to avoid if possible!)

- \* If a word must be divided, divide it between syllables.
- \* Do <u>not</u> divide one-syllable words; do not divide a word so that a single letter stands alone.

### **Tuesday:**

#### **Hyphens with numbers**

*Use a hyphen when writing out two-word numbers from twenty-one through ninety-nine.* Example: Thirty-four people attended the dinner.

#### **Hyphens with fractions**

Use a hyphen when writing fractions that are used as adjectives. (A fraction used as a noun does NOT need a hyphen.)

Example: <u>Two thirds</u> of the ore had been placed in the cart; however, only a <u>four-fifths</u> majority of the carts were available.

In your Writer's Notebook, write a sentence that uses a number that requires a hyphen. Then, write a sentence that uses a fraction as an adjective.

# **Wednesday**: Hyphens after prefixes

Use a hyphen after a prefix that is followed by a proper noun or adjective. Example: Many settlers moved west in the post-Revolutionary years.

Always use a hyphen in words with the prefixes all-, ex-, and self- (and with the suffix —elect). Example: The ex-leader of the student council is now our governor-elect.

In your Writer's Notebook, write a sentence that uses a hyphen after a prefix followed by a proper noun or adjective. Then, write a sentence that includes a word with the prefix of *self-*.

# Thursday: Hyphens with compound modifiers

Use a hyphen to connect a compound modifier that comes before a noun.

Example: Joe was a big-hearted man.

Do not use a hyphen with a compound modifier that includes a word ending in —ly or in a compound proper adjective.

In your Writer's Notebook, write a sentence that includes a compound modifier that uses a hyphen.
